

COVENT GARDEN DESCRIBED

Famous London Market Set Forth in Word-Pictures at Various Periods.

Market gardeners who spend the sleeping hours of the Londoner's morning at Covent Garden would scarcely recognize their place of business in the words: "I acras terre et pasture cum pertinetis vocat The Covent Garden jacentes in parochia Sancti Martini in campus iuxta Charinge Crosse." Yet that was the description of it as held by the earl of Bedford when he leased it on March 10, 1631. Earlier than that, though, in 1570, the same land is d. in granting a lease of it to Lord Burghley, called it his "poyeon or pereill of the Pasture commonly called Covent Garden, and other tenements situate in the high streate of Westminster, commonly called the Stronde." A present description of Covent Garden might be better spelled, perhaps, but it would be less picturesque. "Commonly" ceases to be common when it can be spelled as you please.

CAUSE OF SLOW GROWTH.

Cause of Retarded Development of California Is Laid to Scarcity of Coal.

One of the causes which has somewhat retarded the development of California, particularly in the mining using line, has been the lack of fuel. The finding of oil in that state has relieved in some degree the situation, but large quantities of coal are still used, most of which has either to be brought in from Austria or other foreign ports, or is brought by rail a distance of 1,000 miles. Recent discoveries in the state indicate that coal in large quantities exists in that locality at two different points, and development is being pushed with vigor. While this means a loss of some immediate traffic to the railroads, it promises large gains in the future. The development of the resources of that state has only begun, and correspondingly the present volume of railroad traffic therein is the only promise of what will come in the future.

LITTLE SLEEP FOR SULTAN.

Fear of Assassination Is Cause of Insomnia of Abdul Hamid, Turkish Monarch.

The sultan of Turkey sleeps only two or three hours of the 24, and then when someone is reading or singing or a musician is performing in the adjoining room. This insomnia, which is chronic, has been brought about by constant fear of assassination. A light is always burning in his room, and Ismet Bey, his foster brother, and greatest favorite of the imperial whirling, sleeps with him in the same chamber. Ismet Bey is the most trusted member of the sultan's court; and, as he closely resembles his master in appearance, he not infrequently impersonates Abdul Hamid on those occasions on which the sultan appears in public ceremonies where a risk of assassination is involved.

Empress Wants Big Flowers.

The dowager empress of China, that lady of most uncertain temper, is magnificent in her taste and hates all poor specimens of flowers. She is said to constantly scold her gardeners because the colossal chrysanthemums they raise do not appear to be large enough and she has also expressed her displeasure that all trees could not be made to produce flowers and fruit simultaneously as do orange and lemon trees.

Fortune to Richard Beswick. Report from San Fran. Franchise set forth, James' shadow in the United States. Crime, others has rendered a decision which gives promise of adding nearly \$8000 to the already comfortable fortune of Richard Beswick, a well known capitalist of Ashland, Oregon. The decision in question, open R. D. Dorris, Jr., Dorris and others v. Dorris, big stockmen of Modoc County, California, to pay to Beswick \$95,588.65, which amount Beswick sued for on promissory notes dating back more than 30 years.

In 1874, when Nathaniel Beswick, wounded in the Modoc Indian War, was taken to San Francisco to have his injuries properly treated, his brother, Richard, spent his last dollar in caring for him, but the wounded man died, leaving his brother as an heirloom a bit of paper which promised that P. A. Dorris & Bro. would pay the bearer \$9,000 for value received in services, etc., on the Dorris cattle ranches. Richard also held the Dorris' note for \$900 for services rendered.

Through many years, it is said, the plaintiff, Beswick, has renewed the two notes as one at 10 per cent interest, each year, the amount of interest being added to the principal until the last note, made in June, 1887, amounted to \$55,388. Added to this, the interest up to date brings the total to over \$100,000.
