However, we believe that from an economical standpoint, there is not enough travel to justify the expenditure of sufficient money to build two good and safe bridges across the sloughs, one at the stone bridge crossing and one at Flag Staff.

The thing that seems most sensible to do now, as it appears to The Examiner, is for the people interested to decide upon some one crossing to be bridged and then ask and petition the county to give them relief.

We believe, too, that if the Stone bridge is to be repaired, it should be put in good shape and made safe, and if it is not to be then the county should condemn it, thus relieving itself of the responsibility of accidents that might occur there in the future. 
