Seeking Aid in City.

President Geo. T. Baldwin and Secretary Wm. S. Worden, of the Klamath Chamber of Commerce appeared before representatives of the commercial bodies of San Francisco last Saturday requesting that funds be raised by them to complete the bonus of \$100,000 required by the managers of the Weed road to complete that line to Klamath Falls. They pointed out to the representatives of the business men of San Francisco the manifest advantage they would have over the rival city of Portland in securing the trade of the Klamath country in case the Weed road was built to the metropolis of this section; that Portland was fully aware of the present and future value of the trade of the Klamath country and that she was making a strenuous effort to secure more direct connection with the Falls, and that if San Francisco did not avail herself of the present opportunity Portland was liable to do so, and once she did it would require strenuous effort to displace her.

These arguments seemed to have the desired effect, for a committee, composed of Andrew Carrigan, H. D. Loveland and James P. Currier, was appointed to solicit the \$15,000 required to complete the bonus. It is expected the money will be raised without difficulty—Klamath Falls Express.
