#### Notice of Change of Boundaries of The Burns and Lakeview Land Districts in the State of Oregon.

Notice is hereby given that the Pres-ident of the United States, by Execu-tive order of March 29, 1905, has, pursuant to the provisions of section 2253 of the Revised Statutes of the United States, and by virtue of the authority land districts, in the State of Oregon, be changed and reestablished as follows, which described boundaries shall constitute the Burns land district, and that district be detached therefrom and attached to and made a part of the Burns land district, and the archives, records, and business pertaining to such lands transferred from the land office at Lakeview, Oregon, to the land office at Burns, Oregon:


