Photography, which has caught the Empire State express in full action by the cinematograph, has also been brought into use to depict, with equal fidelity, action so slow as the growth of a flower. By exposing a plant every quarter of an hour for 15 days to a camera it is now possible to watch a bud open gradually; to see the blossoms close at night and reopen in the morning; to see the leaves increase in size and the stamens peep out. And all in the space of a minute or two.

The question as to the right of women 18 years of age, but under 21, to take up timber land in California has always been decided adversely by the local land officers, always had the right to take up State lands. In the two test cases of Eda Laird and Georgia Gleason, of this place, heard at Susanville some time ago, the Land Office rejected the applications, but attorney E. C. Bonner took an appeal from the decision to the Hon. Commissioner of the General Land Office, which officer, upon investigation, decided in favor of Mr. Bonner's contention, and reversed the action of the Susanville Land Office. The Register of the Susanville Land Office was decidedly game, and has appealed the matter from the Commissioner to the Secretary of the Interior. His decision on the matter will decide a much mooted question in California.—Alturas New Era.

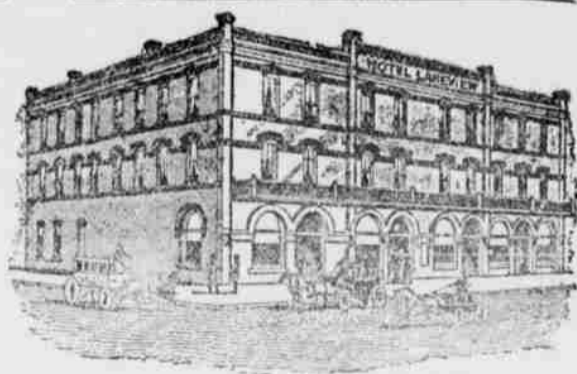


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
