#### There are Others.

One of the most disgusting features of the Reclamation Service is the fact that the officials are allowed to parley, law, dilly-dally and spend thousands of dollars in costly time, lawsuits and purchase of previous rights and franchises, that ought to be spent on actual construction work. Word comes from Washington now to the effect that the government may take up the irrigation of the desolate country. This entire project is covered by private irrigation schemes, which are satisfactory to the settlers, and must be done at an enormous price if the government gets them out of the field.

Why in the name of common sense should the rights of the Reclamation Service, growing from public lands, be being squandered up under a private company, and the simple property of the government, and the rights of the people, be being sold off to private interests? The agents of the Reclamation Service do doubt prefer to work under the railroad, but if they are working under a just law they should not be permitted to confine their operations to localities most convenient to themselves and to the detriment of outlying sections.

The Carey law permitted private companies to segregate lands, spend a few thousand dollars in preliminary operations, and if the Reclamation law is to come along and pay these companies several times the amount of money they have expended for something that is of no real value to the government, charging it up to the Service, to be paid by the settler, it looks like the settlers in some localities are to be sapped for double payment for the water they get, while in other places equally deserving of irrigation get nothing because all the money has been spent for buying out private companies. The money of the Reclamation fund was intended for the benefit of the homebuilder and not for schemers.
