COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS.

A regular term of the County Court for the County of Lake, State of Oregon, for the transaction of County business was begun and held at the County Court House in Lakeview, Oregon, on Wednesday, May 3rd, 1905, officers present, Hon. B. Daly, Judge, C. W. Dent, Commissioner, A. W. Manning, Clerk and E. E. Rinehart, Sheriff, the following proceedings were had:

In the matter of the application of F. W. Silvertooth, for a license to sell spirituous, malt and vinous liquors, etc., at Silver Lake Precinct, Lake County, Oregon.

This matter coming on to be heard upon the petition of F. W. Silvertooth for a license to sell spirituous, malt and vinous liquors at Silver Lake Precinct, of Lake County, Oregon; and it appearing to the satisfaction of the Court from the proofs of service on file herein that the said F. W. Silvertooth has obtained the signatures of an actual majority of all the legal voters of said Silver Lake Precinct to a petition therefor, and thereupon caused the said petition, together with a notice of the day on which he would apply to this Court for such license, to be published for four consecutive weeks in the Central Oregonian, a weekly newspaper printed and published in said Silver Lake Precinct, beginning with the issue of the 30th day of March, 1905, and also caused copies of said notice and petition to be posted for four consecutive weeks in three of the most public places in said precinct, and it further appearing that each of the persons who signed said petition was, at the date he signed the same, and for more than thirty days immediately next preceding the date on which he signed the same, had been actual residents of and residing in said Silver Lake Precinct, and in said Silver Lake Precinct; and that said petition contains the names of a majority of the legal voters of said precinct at the date of the presentation of said petition. And the said F. W. Silvertooth having presented to this Court the receipt of the County Treasurer for the sum of four hundred dollars; and has also executed a bond to the County in the penal sum of one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars which has been duly approved by the court.

It is therefore ordered that a license issue to F. W. Silvertooth, to sell spirituous, malt and vinous liquors, or fermented elder, at Silver Lake Precinct, in Lake County, Oregon, for a period of twelve months from May 21, 1905.

It appearing to the satisfaction of the Court that a petition was on the 3rd day of May, 1905, filed herein, petitioning this Court for an order to hold an election to determine whether the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited in Silver Lake Precinct No. 1 of Lake county, Oregon:

And it further appearing that the requisite number of legal voters residing in said precinct signed said petition and said petition being regular and proper in all things:

It is hereby ordered that an election be held in said Silver Lake Precinct, No. 1, in Lake County, Oregon, on Monday, the 5th day of June, 1905, to determine whether the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited in said Silver Lake Precinct No. 1, in Lake County, Oregon:

That said election be held at the usual voting place for general elections in said precinct as provided by law.

Dated this 4th day of May, 1905.

Will Proceed.

The Klamath Canal Co. has received instructions to proceed with the work of digging their canal and divert water from Link river for irrigation purposes. The attorney for the company and the district attorney has agreed, so says the Klamath Republican, that Link river is not a navigable stream, therefore, the diversion of 5000 inches of water, or more, if needed, will do no great damage, and that the government will not interfere is presumed by the company, so they have turned the water in their ditch and will proceed to fill in and reclaim about 30 acres of land in the town of Klamath Falls, all that will be undertaken at present. The trial will probably not come up till late in the fall.

Irrigation in Washington.

About 150,000 acres of land have been withdrawn in Kittitas county, Washington, and 414,120 acres in Montana, all for reclamation purposes. Fear is expressed in the Palouse country that the irrigation project along the Yakima river will be abandoned. Representative Jones of Washington has sent a letter to the department strongly protesting against the discontinuance of the project. He stated that the land would stand an assessment of more than \$35 per acre for water, for when irrigated, the land would be worth from \$400 to \$500 per acre.

Notice of Change of Boundaries of the Burns and Lakeview Land Districts in the State of Oregon.

Notice is hereby given that the President of the United States, by Executive order of March 29, 1905, has, pursuant to the provisions of section 2253 of the Revised Statutes of the United States, and by virtue of the authority therein given, directed that the boundary lines of the Burns and Lakeview land districts, in the State of Oregon, be changed and reestablished as follows, which described boundaries shall constitute the Burns land district, and that such lands within said boundaries as are now included within the Lakeview land district be detached therefrom and attached to and made a part of the Burns land district, and the archives, records, and business pertaining to such lands transferred from the land office at Lakeview, Oregon, to the land office at Burns, Oregon:

Beginning at a point where the township line between townships twelve and thirteen south intersects the Snake River, thence west along said township line to the northwest corner of township thirteen south, range twenty-four east; thence south along the range line between ranges twenty-three and twenty-four east to the southwest corner of township thirty-two south, range twenty-four east; thence east along the township line between townships thirty-two and thirty-three south to the northeast corner of township thirty-three south, range twenty-eight east; thence south along the range line between ranges twenty-eight and twenty-nine east to the south boundary of the State of Oregon; thence east along said boundary line to the southeast corner of the State of Oregon; thence north and northerly along the east boundary of the State of Oregon to the place of beginning.

In pursuance of said Executive order, the change of boundaries and the transfer of the archives, records, and business pertaining to the lands transferred, will take effect on July 1, 1905.
