Mrs. Steiner's Father Dead.

Last Wednesday Mrs. Dr. Steiner received a telegram bearing the very sad news of the death of her father.

The Salem Statesman has the following to say:

In the death of Dr. T. L. Golden, after a long illness, the city of Salem loses one of its most highly respected citizens and the state of Oregon one of its oldest inhabitants.

Dr. Golden was at one time one of the best known eye specialists in the state, but he had retired from practice several years ago on account of his failing health, and occupied himself with lighter and more exhilarating work.

He was born in St. Louis in 1839, and crossed the plains twice in the

very early days to the Oregon country.

He was married to Miss Nancy Patton, of Waldo Hills, who preceded him to the grave during the year 1893.

Three children survive him, namely: Mrs. R. E. L. Steiner of Lakeview, Mrs. W. C. Kerron of Portland, and T. S. Golden of Salem.

He was an honored member of the A. O. U. W. Lodge of Salem, and was buried under the auspices of that order.

The many friends of Mrs. Dr. Steiner sympathize with her in her bereavement.

Amos Whetstone Dead.

Amos W. Whetstone passed away Tuesday night about midnight after a long illness. Mr. Whetstone was taken with typhoid fever some weeks ago, and partially recovered, when he took a setback. He gradually grew worse until the end came.

He was born in Albany, Oregon, and was aged 33 years and 3 months. He leaves to mourn his loss, a wife, who was formerly Miss Anna Morris, four brothers, one sister and a father. One brother, Lafayette, and his sister, Mrs. Ed. Henderson and his father, A. W., live here; the rest of the brothers do not live in this country.

He had all the tender care that a wife and friends could give, and a host of friends of the family sympathize with them in their bereavement.

The funeral will be held today at 10 o'clock, a. m., at the M. E. Church and burial will take place at the West Side cemetery at 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

J. B. McCullough, the Reno druggist and sheep buyer, arrived in Lakeview Monday, and remained here a couple of days. McCullough may buy a few sheep. Notice of Change of Boundaries of The Burns and Lakeview Land Districts in the State of Oregon.

Notice is hereby given that the President of the United States, by Executive order of March 29, 1905, has, pursuant to the provisions of section 2253 of the Revised Statutes of the United States, and by virtue of the authority therein given, directed that the boundary lines of the Burns and Lakeview land districts, in the State of Oregon, be changed and re-established as follows, which described boundaries shall constitute the Burns land district, and that such lands within said boundaries as are now included within the Lakeview land district be detached therefrom and attached to and made a part of the Burns land district, and the archives, records, and business pertaining to such lands transferred from the land office at Lakeview, Oregon, to the land office at Burns, Oregon:

Beginning at a point where the township line between townships twelve and thirteen south intersects the Snake River, thence west along said township line to the northwest corner of township thirteen south, range twenty-four east; thence south along the range line between ranges twenty-three and twenty-four east to the southwest corner of township thirty-two south, range twenty-four east; thence east along the township line between townships thirty-two and thirty-three south to the northeast corner of township thirty-three south, range twenty-eight east; thence south along the range line between ranges twenty-eight and twenty-nine east to the south boundary of the State of Oregon; thence east along said boundary line to the southeast corner of the State of Oregon; thence north and northerly along the east boundary of the State of Oregon to the place of beginning.

In pursuance of said Executive order, the change of boundaries and the transfer of the archives, records, and business pertaining to the lands transferred, will take effect on July 1, 1905.
