Calls It Moonshine.

"It is just plain moonshine," said ex-Governor McConnell yesterday when questioned by a Tribune reporter as to his view of the forest reserve movement in Idaho. Governor McConnell arrived yesterday afternoon from Moscow on a business trip and will return home this morning. He said:
"The creation of those Clearwater reserves will not and cannot serve the purpose that is claimed by the department. As I understand it an object of the reserve is to conserve nature's water storage. Nature, however, makes its own forest reserves. Anybody acquainted with the Clearwater forests will tell you that. The thick timber, or more clearly, the marketable timber, lies along the immediate river basin where there are no deep snows at all. In the higher snow country the timber is inferior and not of a merchantable grade and therefore, will not be moved, except to meet the limited demands of the mining industry. This reserve movement seems to me to be but another step to create more jobs for the office holders. It is true that agents are doing some good in preventing the theft of timber from the government, but the forest reserve menace has gone beyond such purpose."—Lewiston Tribune.
