R. S. Bean for Judge.

Charles H. Robb, Assistant Attorney-General of the United States, spent today in Salem, where he met all the state officers and the most prominent attorneys in the city. While he declines to be interviewed it is understood that the purpose of his visit is to learn what he can concerning the qualifications of candidates for the office of United States District Judge, made vacant by the death of Judge Bellinger.

Supreme Judge R. S. Bean is the most prominent candidate for the appointment here, and has the unqualified indorsement of his associates on the bench. Chief Justice Wolverton and Justice Moore, Justices Wolverton and Moore wrote to President Roosevelt, certifying to the ability and good standing of Henry E. McGinn, as a member of the Oregon bar, but in the same letter expressed themselves as unalterably in favor of Justice Bean as the successor of Judge Bellinger.

Governor Chamberlain's friends have been speculating considerably of late concerning the possibility of his appointment to the Federal Judgeship. They argue that since Judge Bellinger was a Democrat, it would be proper for the President to appoint a Democrat to succeed him. They say that Chamberlain's standing in the state is sufficiently attested by his election as Chief Executive in the face of a large Republican majority, and his ability as a lawyer by his having been appointed and afterwards elected Attorney-General of the state. The Democrats have little hope that the Governor will be appointed, however, unless the President and Senator Fulton should be unable to agree upon a Republican appointee.

Chamberlain's friends take occasion to remark that if he were appointed to the Federal bench, he would be out of state politics, and the next Republican nominee for the Governorship would be assured of an election as soon as he is nominated.

Circuit Judge George H. Burnett and Attorney George G. Bingham are among the Salem men talked of as possible appointees to succeed Judge Bellinger.—(Oregonian).

Mitchell's Daughter Dies.

Mrs. Jessie B. Chapman, wife of Judge W. O. Chapman, of Tacoma, and daughter of Senator John H. Mitchell, died at her home in Tacoma, Washington, on May 26, of appendicitis.

New Idaho Reserve.

In spite of the bitter opposition of Senator Heyburn, Governor Gooding, Representative French and others to the administration's forestry policy in Idaho, the president has signed a proclamation creating four forest reserves in that state, embracing 2,510,000 acres of land. All these reserves were strongly recommended by the forestry bureau and by Senator Dubois.
