When the packet was near the Narrows two men rowed to the boat and boarded her. They were dressed in plain civilian dress, and after a private conference with the captain quietly directed Mr. Wilson to proceed Southward, unopposed, in fact, to the south of all, and a general disgust of many of the

people.

as to what would be done.
