a coming time.

Comes now Frank Ruggles and presents to the Court, a person signed by himself and eleven others, praying for the finding out, establishing and construction of a county road, as follows:

Commencing at a point where the section line between sections 28 and 19, in Township 35 South, of Range 24 East of Willamette Meridian, crosses Honey Creek, thence following a course nearly due North along what is commonly known as the "Old Harvey Road," leading northward from the present post office of Plush, into Harney Valley, to a point where the road leading to Jones Salt House, on the South bank of Flagstaff Lake, leaves said Old Harvey road, being at or near the northeast corner of section 9, in Township 35 South, of Range 24 East, thence along said last mentioned road easterly to the Jones Salt House in lot 3, of section 5, of Township 35 South, of Range 25 East, thence easterly crossing the slough at or near said salt house and following along the present traveled road leading to W. H. Bond's place in section 11, in said last mentioned township and range, being along the southerly shore of Flagstaff Lake, to a point at or near where the mainline line of said road intersects the section line between sections 3 and 4 of said last mentioned Township and range, thence continuing along said present traveled road, and terminating at or near the northeast corner of W. H. Bond's place in section 11, Township 35 South, of Range 25 East, being a terminus at the intersection of the county road leading from Warner Valley, in section 10, Township 34 South, of Range 25 East, to the south end of said proposed road.

And it appears to the Court, that the petition is signed by twelve inhabitants of said county, Oregon, residing within Road District No. 5, the road district in which the said proposed road is petitioned to be established; that said petition specifies the place of beginning, intermediate points and termination of said road, that due notice has been given by advertisement placed in the place of holding said court, to wit, in Enterprise, Lake County, Oregon, one notice at each end of said proposed road, one at approximately the center thereof, and one on the county court house of said county, more than thirty days prior to the presentation of said petition to said court, notifying all persons concerned that application would be made at the present session of said court; that the notices so posted were in due form, and duly signed by the said petitioners, and so posted as to be in plain view of passersby and in public and conspicuous places, and that a bond for the costs of these proceedings has been given and approved.

It is hereby ordered, that Harry Bailey and W. K. Schumacher acting with E. Moore, County Surveyor, of Lake County, Oregon, shall commence the work of Road Viewers, in accordance, and that they meet at Plush, Lake County, Oregon, on the 8th day of August, 1895, and after qualifying, proceed to view, survey and lay off said proposed road according to law.

In the matter of the petition of W. P. Moulder for a License to sell spirituous, malt and vinous liquors in less quantities than one gallon, in North Warner Precinct, Lake County, Oregon;

It appearing to the satisfaction of the Court, that W. P. Moulder has complied with all the requirements of law in the premises;

It is hereby ordered, that a License to sell spirituous, malt and vinous liquors in less quantities than one gallon, in North Warner Precinct, Lake County, Oregon, for a period of six months from the date thereof, be issued to the said W. P. Moulder.

In the matter of the claims of witnesses for the defendant in the case of the State of Oregon against J. F. Kane, the same are hereby continued for investigation as to whether or not said claims are a legal liability against Lake County.

All other matters pending continued.

Court adjourned without day.

Fourth of July Casualties.
The Fourth of July casualties this year do not promise to be as large as those of 1894 and previous years,

and the losses caused by the Chicago Tribune at 4 o'clock show a similar number, with the total probably increasing.

Precious experience has shown that fatalities resulting from the Fourth of July far into the year. Last year the reports received later in the morning doubled the early figures, and when the final statistics were compiled a month later nearly 300 deaths were recorded, mostly due to tetanus, which developed after July 4. The same increase of cases may be expected this year.

On the whole, however, the agitation against a noisy and bloody celebration seems to have had its effect. In Baltimore, Kansas City and Wisconsin the laws against deadly fireworks were enforced generally, and the number of casualties decreased.

In some of the Western cities we give the numbers as published in the Oregonian July 5th.

Cheyenne 1 dead 3 injured, Los Angeles 4 injured, Salem, Oregon 2 injured, Tacoma 2 injured, San Francisco 3 dead 3 injured. Total in the United States, 42 dead, 2431 injured.

The loss by fire is estimated at \$15,000.
