

Two Pairs of Interlocked Horns.

Interlocked pairs of horns were found by Wade Sawyer, who was hunting near Lakeview, Oregon. He presented them to the firm of Whorton & Smith, who mounted them on a board ornamented with a decorative design. In which the letters W. S. appear. It is noted from the condition of the horns when found, that the deer had not been dead many weeks. The horns are fine specimens, one set belonging to a deer three years old, and the other to a deer a year older. They are so closely locked, that it is impossible to force them apart without breaking them. The deer must have made frantic efforts to get free before they gave up the struggle and died.

Root to Succeed Hay.

President Roosevelt may be depended upon, that if ever understood that he was to support Fairbanks, neither Cortelyou nor Root will be a candidate.

Prepare Meal Without Fire.
In the recent news many people have noticed one or two references to the fact that tinned meats for the Russian troops are prepared by a process which enables the contents of each can to be served hot without a fire.
