Chicago Strike Called Off.

By an overwhelming vote, the striking teamsters, on July 20, decided to call off the strike which has held Chicago in turmoil for 165 days. It is an unconditional surrender and the men will seek their old positions as individuals. They have even lost the best point for which they have been holding off—permission to display the union button. Owing to the peculiar condition there, life would be unsafe for any man not displaying the union button, and the employers were firm on this point, and the button must go, along with the closed shop and the business agent.

Born in iniquity and conducted along infamous lines throughout, the strike was really lost the day it began. Charges that it was called because the firm of Montgomery Ward & Co. would not pay \$3000 to certain labor leaders as "graft" have never been satisfactorily denied. After the garment workers had lost their struggle the fight was passed along to the teamsters, up to this time the most powerful labor body in the city, and considered inviolable. Cornelius P. Shen came from Boston to conduct the fight.
