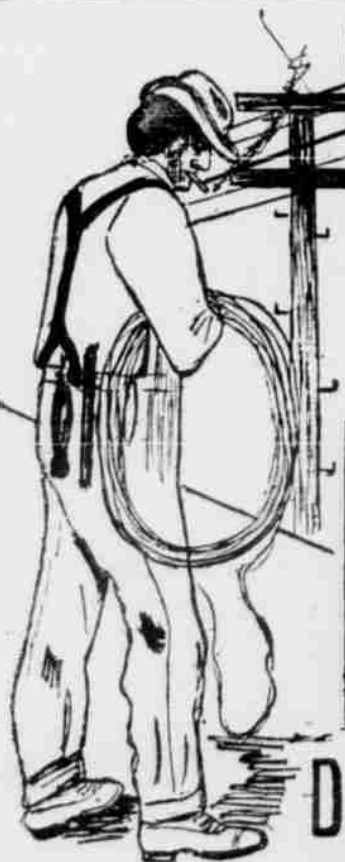

It is hereby ordered that a special term of the County Court, of Lake County, Oregon, for the transaction of County business, be called to meet at the County Court room of said County, at Lakeview, Oregon, on Thursday, Sept. 28th, 1905, at the hour of 10 o'clock A. M. of said day, for the examination, consideration and determination of the following matters:

All claims duly filed against said County; the statutory bonds of County officers; the reports of Road Viewers; the official transaction of County officers; application for Liquor License and all matters pertaining to County roads and bridges.

It is further ordered that the County Clerk prepare two certified copies of this order and deliver the same to the sheriff, who is hereby directed to forthwith serve one copy thereof upon each County commissioner of said County and make due return thereof.

It is further ordered that a copy of this order be duly published for the information of the public.
