Railroad Interest Centers Here.

Oregon is returning its share of interest from railroad builders. Not only Harriman roads and hill roads are trying to enter the state, but the Santa Fe has had a crew of surveyors along the coast between Portland, Calif., and Astoria, Oregon, and they have submitted their report. Word goes out now that the Santa Fe will build a coast line from Eureka to Astoria, with branch lines to important shipping points in Western Oregon. Harriman is in a whirlwind, and has his hands full trying to protect Oregon trade. He is attacked on all sides. The following was contained in the Portland Telegram, after a general review of the railroad situation in Oregon:

"It is said that fear that the Santa Fe will connect with the Portland, Nehalem & Tillamook on its way up the coast and then continue on its way to Astoria, together with the heralded intention of the Northern Pacific, has caused Mr. Harriman to exert every influence to hold back the work this winter, hoping to meet the Northern Pacific at least the only connection with the mountains during the winter."

These road numbers are sharpened. Harriman, local members are certain of his designs to the other railroads and early is being forced to the East, so built through Southwestern Oregon to Longview, then on to Portland and with a branch to Roseburg, connecting with a transcontinental line from the East to Canada. If this is realized, Mr. Harriman has another right on his hands in the project to divide the state with his east and west line from Natron to Ontario."

Lakeview has always taken a justifiable pride in its schools and this year should be no exception. The board of directors has engaged a corps of able and experienced teachers and while all directly connected with the institution of learning are displaying that spirit of sincere interest that assures a successful term this same spirit of sincere interest should extend beyond the school-room and enter the homes of the parents, who should manifest it by frequent visits during school hours.

Benton county people were probably so engrossed in their own strife to relieve their county of indebtedness that they failed to notice the prosperity of Lake county. It is a happy situation and this Benton correspondent probably should be pardoned for his egotism.

Here is his bouquet:

"Assessor Davis has just completed his assessment roll for Benton county for 1905. He finds the total valuation of all property in the county to be \$4,970,880. Benton county alone of all counties in the state is entirely out of debt and pays cash for all warrants as fast as drawn."
