Railroad Interest Centers Here.

Oregon is attracting attention of interest from railroad builders. Not only Harriman roads and Hill roads are trying to enter the state, but the Santa Fe has had a crew of surveyors along the coast between Eureka, Calif., and Astoria, Oregon, and they have submitted their report. Word goes out now that the Santa Fe will build a coast line from Eureka to Astoria, with branch lines to important shipping points in Western Oregon. Harriman is a whirlwind, and has his hands full trying to protect Oregon trade. He is attacked on all sides. The following was contained in the Portland Telegram, after a general review of the railroad situation in Oregon:

"It is said that fear that the Santa Fe will connect with the Portland, Seaside and Tillamook on its way up the coast, and then continue on its way to Astoria, together with the revealed intention of the Northern Pacific, has stirred Mr. Harriman to erect every barrier he can think of to keep the Santa Fe from connecting with the coast."

"These two matters are keeping themselves, from moment to moment, in the foreground of the public mind, and only is being buried in the past to hold through Southwestern Oregon to Lincoln, then on to Portland and with a branch to Coos Bay, connecting with a trans-continental line from the East to Omaha. If this is realized, Mr. Harriman has another fight on his hands in the project to divide the state with bisecting and west line from Naton to Ontario."

Lakeview has always taken a justifiable pride in its schools, and this year should be no exception. The board of directors has engaged a corps of able and experienced teachers and while all directly connected with the institution of learning are displaying that spirit of sincere interest that assures a successful term this same spirit of sincere interest should extend beyond the school-room and enter the homes of the parents, who should manifest it by frequent visits during school hours.

Out of Debt With Both Eyes Shut.

A Benton County correspondent to the Portland Telegram, with his eyes and ears plugged up, makes the bold and false assertion that Benton county is the only county in the state that is out of debt and pays cash for its warrants as fast as they are issued. The fact that Lake county went out of debt six months ago and paid cash on its warrants as fast as they were issued was heralded all over the state, not only through the columns, but through the Portland Oregonian. Benton county people were probably so entranced in their own spite to believe their county of indebtedness that they failed to notice the prosperity of Lake county. It is a happy situation and this Benton correspondent probably should be pardoned for his egoism.

Here is his bouquet:

"Assessor Davis has just completed his assessment roll for Benton county for 1905. He finds the total valuation of all property in the county to be \$4,979,800. Benton county alone of all counties in the state is entirely out of debt, and pays cash for all warrants as fast as drawn."

W. W. Brown was called as a witness in the Williamson trial to prove the good character of the defendants. Mr. Brown and the Judge had a soft time of words and the Judge went out, but "we'll bet 'til" some time from regular word issues.

"Silver Lake is 100 miles from anywhere," said J. C. Turney, a Lake County citizen, to-day, "and for that reason we did not go to the trouble of exhibiting our resources at the exposition."

Mr. Turney, however, said the Telegram, has quite a unique exhibit of fruits, vegetables, grains and grasses at its temporary quarters, room 66, Labbe building.

"We have plenty of water to irrigate with were we to decide on artificial watering of our fields," he said, "but we do not need it just now. We have lots of room for new people and the lack of railroad facilities is our only drawback."

"Lake county is as big as some of the Eastern states, and it is 100 miles from Silver Lake to Lakeview, the county seat."

Called Home.

John Rogers Cook, aged 72 years, died at Cedarville, Cal., Sept. 13.

The above simple words tell the passing of another pioneer settler of Surprise Valley. In early days he fought Indians and preached as the occasion required and for years he was the only exponent of the gospel in the valley, and was well known all over the county as "Parson Cook."

John Rogers Cook was born in Ireland 72 years ago last February, and came to the United States while a boy. He came to Surprise valley in 1864, and has resided here almost continuously ever since. In 1875 he was married to Miss Isabelle Jane Holman, who preceded him to the grave only a few short weeks ago. No children resulted from the union. He represented this district in the Assembly one term, and was also elected tax collector of Modoc county for one term.—Cedarville Record.
