#### New Rules on Reservation.

Mr. Horace G. Wilson will inaugurate a new set of rules governing allotments to stockmen for grazing lands within the Klamath Indian Reservation. It begins to look like the stockman who can not maintain a staff of clerks, stenographers, surveyors, bookkeepers, special agents and a lobby at the legislatures, equal in number to several times their string of vaqueros, had better go out of business. If he don't want the trouble of going out of business, he can turn his stock on the range as he has done in part, depending on his vaqueros to look after them and the agents on the various reserves, Indian, Forest and one kind and another, will put them out of business mighty quick.

Below are some of Mr. Wilson's new rules, as published in the Silver Lake Oregonian last week:

"To stockmen on or near this reservation—From January 1, 1906, all stockmen will be required to have an improved lease on each individual allotment drawn through this office. All leases drawn outside this office or any payments made to Indians for the use of their lands, will not be considered. Leases will be started here to those applying for the coming year and they will be of a different form than formerly used. Kindly have your leases drawn this winter so they will be approved before March 1, 1906, by the Department of the Interior.

In regard to leases on tribal land you are requested to be cautious as to the number of cattle you graze on this land, as all cattle found on tribal land above the number stated in your permit will be taken up and you will be required to pay the expense of corraling them in addition to the amount charged for pasturage. If you have allotted lands rented, your cattle must be kept on the lands and not allowed to graze on tribal land unless a permit is given you for the number desired to graze on unallotted land.

No sheep will be allowed on the reservation.

I request that all parties, both Indians and whites, having stock with brands and who have brands of their own furnish me with a copy of the brand on a piece of board and a statement telling where they are placed on the animal; also any cuts

which complete your marking for animals for identification. These brands and markings will be placed on file for reference of this office. In the future I also request that if any cattle is purchased from any person desiring to leave the reservation or any person changing their brand they should notify this office the brand or brands and markings they have. All cattle without a brand or any cattle with a brand not known to this office will be taken up as estrays and will be sold after a reasonable length of time at auction that is found on this reservation.

This also applies to horses. Corraling of stock for the purpose of counting may be conducted by me or any employe under me any time during the summer should occasion require. Care will be taken, however, with the stock in driving them."
