The absence of a president to call the meeting to order for several months has served as a handicap. The members who have never dispaired, gathered at the Court House and elected Daniel Boone, one of the most enthusiastic members from the beginning, as chairman for the night.

Nothing of a disgruntied spirit has ever existed in the League, or caused it to smolder, but inactivity can easily be accounted for in the fact that all the officials, president and vice president, have been, all summer long, so engrossed in business affairs, that no time was given to League business. Now that winter is on, the evenings are long and the rush of the senson's business matters is over, there is no good reason to doubt that something will result from our organization.

Some of the features that enthused the meeting were the speaches, especially those of Dr. Daly, J. N. Watson and chairman Daniel Boone. Dr. Daly outlined a policy for the League to pursue and offered it as a suggestion, which met with the unanimous approval of the other members present. He dwelt long and fluently upon the possibilities of Lake county and the urgent need of a railroad, and pointed out reasonable solutions of the difficulties of securing what seems now paramount to our needs-railroads. A little smattering of jealousy of our sister county was visable on the speaker's stern countenance as he waxed eloquent over the possibilities of our own great county.

Pardonable as his jealousy may be, it is only acknowledgement of the inactivity on the part of influential men of this county that has permitted our neighbors to assume a more important standing than we claim. Let the spirit of emulation get into the hearts of every man in the county. It will stir him as nothing else will do. Let him taste the bitterness of rivalry, if the sweetness of a prosperous future will not drive him to activity: Let the world surge ahead and leave "the devil to take the filudermost," If he chooses to remain in his peaceful slumbers while awakening has seized his neighbor, We have not a single man in mind when we say these things, but the public in general,

Proud though we are, and ever have been, with fortune smiling upon our county, the time has come when fortune will cense to smile upon drollery; get a move on and if we have lagged, eatch up with the rest of the fleeling world. We are not behind, if we only will seize the opportunity that has offered much to others, and which is knocking at our

A few bills were allowed and a number of communications were read. The remainder of the evening was devoted to planning for a future course for the League.
