### Gold Output of Nation.

The production of gold in the United States during 1904 amounted to 3,910,729 fine ounces, valued at \$80,655,946. This represents an increase of \$7,243,948 over the production of 1903. The largest previous output in 1902 amounted to \$80,000,000. The production of silver in 1904 amounted to 55,969,864 fine ounces, valued at \$22,035,378. This represents an increase of 1,669,864 ounces over the production of 1903 and an increase in value of \$2,713,378.
