Council Meeting.

At the meeting of the City Council Tuesday evening the following business was transacted, with V. L. Snelling, mayor; H. Bailey, J. W. Tucker and J. S. Lane, councilmen and W. B. Snider, recorder, present:
 The petition for liquor license of Light & Harrow was presented and read. On motion petition was approved, bonds accepted and a license ordered issued for three months from November 19th, 1905.
 Report of A. Bleber, treasurer, showed the balance on hand in the town funds as follows: General fund \$104-65, Electric Light fund \$661-59.
 A Resolution was introduced and passed fixing the tax levy for town of Lakeview for the year 1905, as follows: General tax, 3 mills, interest on bonded indebtedness, 5 mills, and Road tax, 1 mill, total tax 9 mills.
 On motion the recorder was ordered to draw a warrant transferring \$500 for the Light and Water fund and deposit the same to the credit of the General fund to repay money borrowed from that fund.
 The report of the Sanitary committee read and ordered filed.
 The following bills were read and approved: W. B. Snider, Recorder salary, \$25; A. Bleber, Treasurer salary, \$10; Chas. Tomninges, Marshal salary, \$75; Examiner, printing, \$2.
