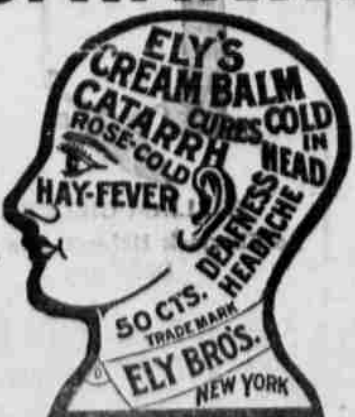

## Kossuth and Austro-Hungary



A LITTLE more than a half century ago Louis Kossuth was one of the most prominent figures in the public eye as the foremost champion of the liberties of Hungarians. Now FRANCIS KOSSUTH, Hungary again in the throes of a movement for greater liberty or possible independence, and again a Kossuth is hailed as leader. He is Francis Kossuth, son of the patriot who pleaded the cause of his countrymen so eloquently some fifty years ago. Then as now it was the Emperor Francis Joseph with whom the advocates of Hungary's rights had to reckon. The elder Kossuth was governor of Hungary during the brief period of its independence in 1849, but on the failure of the movement he fled for many years in exile. In 1857 occurred his famous visit to the United States.

About three years ago Francis Kossuth visited the United States to unveil a monument to his father and was the recipient of many attentions which recalled to old inhabitants the similar honors bestowed upon his sire in days gone by.

Louis Kossuth died in 1894 in Italy. He had lived in that country during the later years of his life, although by the amnesty of 1867 he might have returned to his native land. Francis Kossuth was a civil engineer in Italy when the call came to him soon after his father's death to go to Hungary take a seat in the Hungarian parliament and lead the party which the elder Kossuth had once led. He responded to the call, gave up his Italian citizenship and on arrival in Bucharest was the recipient of many honors. In outlining the policy upon which he had determined he said he would hold fast to his father's principles, but would seek another way toward their realization. He declared in favor of working for the economic in-

dependence of Hungary through peaceable means, expressed his admiration for the Emperor Francis Joseph and avowed his belief that the foundation for the latter's authority over Hungary would be more secure were the independence of that kingdom from Austria in all matters of administration recognized.

The relations existing between Austria and Hungary are peculiar. The two countries constitute a joint monarchy, and Francis Joseph I, who now seventy-five years of age, is emperor of Austria and apostolic king of Hungary. He became emperor of Austria in 1848 and was crowned king of Hungary in 1867. The two states united under this rulership have their separate constitutions and parliaments and each has for most branches state affairs its own ministry and administration, but they are closely bound together by the identity of ruler and by a permanent constitutional union which, upon the common principle of possession and defense, was first proclaimed by the pragmatic sanction of 1723 and has since been regulated by the so called "compromise" of 1867.

In accordance with the constitutional union, foreign affairs and the great part of war affairs and finances relating to them are dealt with by common ministries. The control of those industries and the voting of the common budget are exercised by delegates chosen from the parliaments of the two countries. The proportion of expense to be borne by each is fixed by agreements, which are subject to the expiration of ten years.

For some time there has been discontent in Hungary because of a belief that the rights of that state under agreements forming the basis of union between it and Austria were being infringed upon. The Hungarian party which have formed a coalition in the leadership of Kossuth demand reform of the electoral law and universal suffrage, separation of the Austrian and Hungarian customs and introduction of the Hungarian flag and flag in the army, as contemplated in the "compromise" of 1867. It is reported that the emperor has agreed reforms in the electoral laws in the region of universal suffrage. Whether he will make concessions in other respects sufficient to stave the impending storm remains to be seen.
