

The relations existing between At tria and Hungary are peculiar. T two countries constitute a joint me archy, and Francis Joseph I., who now seventy-five years of age, is e peror of Austria and apostolic king Hungary. He became emperor of A tria in 1848 and was crowned king Hungary in 1867. The two states un ed under this rulership have their s arate constitutions and parliamen and each has for most branches state affairs its own ministry and ministration, but they are clos bound together by the identity of ruler and by a permanent constituti al union which, upon the common pr ciple of possession and defense, first proclaimed by the pragmatic sa tion of 1723 and has since been regu ed by the so called "compromise" 1867.

In accordance with the constitution union, foreign affairs and the gree part of war affairs and finances re ing to them are dealt with by comn ministries. The control of those is istries and the voting of the com budget are exercised by delager chosen from the parliablogts of two countries.
