Fulton on Land Laws.

At the Senate Committee meeting held a few days ago to discuss the public lands question, Senator Fulton outlined his objections to the proposed public lands legislation. He said in part:

"I am opposed to the repeal of the timber and stone act unless some provision shall be substituted whereby timbered land may become private property. Oregon is to be developed by men, not trees. What we want are industries, population and revenueproducing properties. Land owned. by the Government and withdrawn from entry or settlement furnishes neither revenue nor opportunity for industrial development. I am frank to say that I do not want the general Government to retain a foot of land in Oregon outside of what is necessary for its public buildings, forts, military reservations and kindred objects. When land passes into private ownership it at once begins contributing to the public treasury.

I have not opposed the repeal of the timber and stone act absolutely, but have opposed its repeal unless some other plan for the disposal of such land should be substituted. I have stated that, if ample provision shall be made for the sale of matured timber and for a reasonable share of the proceeds being paid to the countles in which the land is located. I would be content. As a result of that question, Senator Hansbrough has altered his repeal bill so as to provide for the sale of matured timber at public auction 10 per cent of the proceeds to go to the counties in which the land is located in lieu of taxes lost to such counties by reason of the retention of the land by the government.
