At a meeting of the executive committee of the National Woolgrowers' Association at Denver, Colorado, on Jan. 31st, resolutions were adopted condemning the administration's policy of taxing stockmen for grazing in forest reserves. A committee was sent to the National capital to oppose the measure.

Died at Los Angeles.

The sad news of the death of S. B. Chandler at the Soldier's Home near Los Angeles, Calif., where he went a couple of years ago was received here last week.

Bazillail S. Chandler was born October 23, 1825, in Ashabulab county, Ohio. In 1847 he left Ohio and went to Illinois, and in 1851 returned to Ohio and was married to Miss Rebecca McKinney on Oct. 29, and they moved to Wisconsin the same year, residing there till the year 1862, when they moved to Iowa, where they lived four years, coming to California in the fall of 1866. They resided in California till 1874, when they moved to this place, locating in Crooked Creek valley, where they resided until a few years ago, they sold their ranch to their son and moved to town, where Mrs. Chandler died three years ago. Mr. Chandler remained in Lakeview for a while and then went to the Soldier's Home near Los Angeles, where he died on Jan. 28th, 1906.

There were 8 children, 6 of whom survive their father, Solomon B. Dan, Heaton L. Mrs. M. E. Kinsey, and Mrs. J. W. Tucker, of Lakeview, and James Chandler of Washington.

Mr. Chandler enlisted in the army in 1863 and served three years in Co. B. 3rd Iowa Infantry. He was buried with Military honor and Religious ceremonies.

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Fulton on Land Laws.

At the Senate Committee meeting held a few days ago to discuss the public lands question, Senator Fulton outlined his objections to the proposed public lands legislation. He said in part:

"I am opposed to the repeal of the timber and stone act unless some provision shall be substituted whereby timbered land may become private property. Oregon is to be developed by men, not trees. What we want are industries, population and revenue-producing properties. Land owned by the Government and withdrawn from entry or settlement furnishes neither revenue nor opportunity for industrial development. I am frank to say that I do not want the general Government to retain a foot of land in Oregon outside of what is necessary for its public buildings, forts, military reservations and kindred objects. When land passes into private ownership it at once begins contributing to the public treasury.

I have not opposed the repeal of the timber and stone act absolutely, but have opposed its repeal unless some other plan for the disposal of such land should be substituted. I have stated that, if ample provision shall be made for the sale of matured timber and for a reasonable share of the proceeds being paid to the counties in which the land is located, I would be content. As a result of that question, Senator Hansbrough has altered his repeal bill so as to provide for the sale of matured timber at public auction 10 per cent of the proceeds to go to the counties in which the land is located in lieu of taxes lost to such counties by reason of the retention of the land by the government. I am contending for a larger percentage for counties. Am I wrong?"

Expenses of Counties.

An increase of about \$170,000 in the annual expense of maintaining county governments in Oregon is shown by the summaries of expenses, filed in the office of Secretary of State Dunbar by the several County Clerks. This increase is shown by a comparison with the reports of four years ago, during which interval nearly every item of expense has shown a marked increase.

Only six counties in the state have cut down their running expenses. Lake county in 1901 expended \$16,685.49, while last year, but \$11,032.59 was expended, a decrease in expenditures of \$5,652.90, one-third of the sum paid in 1901. Other counties that have reduced their running expenses are Benton, Clackamas, Lincoln, Wheeler and Yamhill.

King Christian Dead.

Christian IX, the aged King of Denmark, dean of the crowned heads of Europe, father of King George of Greece, of Queen Alexander of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the Dowager Empress Marie Feodorovna of Russia, grandfather of King Haakon VII of Norway, and related by blood or by marriage, to most of the European rulers, died with startling suddenness in the Amalienborg palace at Copenhagen, Jan. 29, aged 85 years.

The accession of his successor, Prince Frederick, his eldest son, who will be known as Frederick VIII, has already been proclaimed.

Visited Klamath Falls

The Hon. Walter L. Toozee, Republican candidate for congress from the First Congressional district, comprising Western and Southeastern Oregon, visited Klamath county several days last week in the interests of his candidacy. Lake and Klamath are the Eastern Oregon counties in the First district. Mr. Toozee delivered some fine addresses to the people of Klamath county, and went back on the other side of the mountain to finish his campaigning tour.

The Klamath Republican says Mr. Toozee is the only politician of the three candidates for congress from the First district, and is making a hard fight on political lines.
