Gerber in Town.

Louis Gerber, the well-known Klamath stockman was in our city Tuesday. Mr. Gerber informed an Examiner reporter that there are not over 1000 head of beef cattle left on the great Klamath alfalfa feeding grounds. He says there were over 20,000 tons of alfalfa hay fed out there since November first, and hay has advanced to \$7 and \$8 per ton. Over 10,000 head of beef and 20,000 head of sheep were fed there for the California market.

Regarding irrigation matters Mr. Gerber said, the construction of the first 3-mile section of the great irrigation project at a cost of \$378,000 will begin next month. This is the first of the six sections to be let for one of the best irrigation schemes in the United States, which will cost the government over \$4,000,000.

Klamath Falls is a very lively town, and Merrill and Bonanza, Mr. Gerber predicts, will be among the most thriving towns in a few years in Southern Oregon. With the railroad assured Merrill will be one of the greatest shipping points for livestock, wool and grain on the Pacific Coast.

Residents of Klamath county, he says, are anxious that Lake county push to completion the telephone line from Lakeview to Bly and join hands with them in communication to the outside world, and that they will do their part.

"In Mad Chase."

Washington society and visitors to Washington this season value nothing so highly as an invitation to the Longworth-Roosevelt wedding, and nothing is harder to obtain. There is a limited circle, the friends and relatives of Miss Roosevelt and Mr. Longworth and the recognized leaders of Washington society, who are certain to receive invitations, but beyond this circle there is doubt. The list of invited guests is not yet completed, and it is not known who has been chosen.

But there is a mighty struggle, bordering on a conspiracy, among those outside the "inner circle," and their goal is an invitation to the White House wedding. These invitations, when issued, will be nontransferable, but out of the number that leave the White House not a few will be sold for a good price to persons having the means, but not the position to get in. That is characteristic of Washington society.

White House weddings are very rare; seldom does the daughter of a president marry in that historic building, and for that reason there is the greatest imaginable clamor for cards of admission. The coming wedding is as near an approach to the royal weddings of Europe as any that is likely to occur in this country in a quarter of a century; it is, from every standpoint, a crowning social event. When it is over, society will have little to look forward to this season; the most brilliant events will pale into insignificance.

Is it any wonder, therefore, that invitations should be in such demand? The few that are offered for sale will bring big prices because the persons seeking them, the unofficial element of Washington society, is a wealthy set; they care little how they spend their money, and when they cannot break in they are willing to buy their way in. And some of them will succeed.—Oregonian.

Ninety were Converted.

Brother Bailey returned from New Pine Creek Sunday afternoon after a two weeks meeting in which the Spirit of God was visibly manifested. Many souls in the State line town and vicinity were awakened to the true joys of Christian religion.

Between twenty-five and thirty souls were born into the kingdom of God, eleven of which were baptised into the Baptist church of New Pine Creek.

There were also 5 members joined by relation.

It is acknowledged by all who attended the meetings at Pine Creek that no greater interest in a religious meeting was ever known there.

Brother Bailey manifested a truly Christ like spirit which touched the hearts of all and many sad hearts were the result of his departure.

Pine Creek people showed their generous natures by donating to Brother Bailey \$100.95, this making in all \$271.75, as a recompense of his labors among us, but Brother Bailey's reward was not in the money he received but in the satisfaction of knowing that 90 souls claimed conversion under his six weeks meetings.

Brother Bailey preached his farewell sermon here Sunday evening, the church was crowded and a marked interest was shown. The meeting resulted in two conversions and three candidates for baptism, this making a total of 30 members added to the First Baptist Church of Lakeview by baptism, and five by relation.

The congregation seemed reluctant to leave the church, and long after their dismissal they lingered shaking hands and talking of the blessings they received.

There has been a great work done here and many anxious hearts are praying for Brother Bailey's return among us. He left Monday morning for his home at Fossil, Oregon, where he is pastor of a Baptist church.

Danduraud of Brockton, Mass., is looking for his father, Isaac Danduraud, who left Deseriviers, Canada, 27 years ago, went to Sacramento, Cal., remained there a few months and then went to Helena, Montana, in 1879, working there until 1885. He went away in the month of June with horses and wagon, also, it is supposed, with his money. Nothing has been heard from him since.
