### Samuel E. Sloan.

Samuel E. Sloan of Adel, died last Thursday evening at 3:30 o'clock in Lakeview. About four weeks ago Mr. Sloan, who has a ranch near Adel, in Warner valley, was thought to be insane by his neighbors, as he attempted suicide once, and was trying to give his property away to any one with whom he talked. The authorities in Lakeview were notified by telephone, and the people of Adel were requested to bring the man to Lakeview. The roads across the mountain at that time were impassable, so J. M. Handley and Andy Morris brought the patient to Lakeview by the circuitous route of Plush and Abert Lake, a distance of about 125 miles. The trip was a severe one on the sick man, and when he arrived here he was in a bad shape. Dr. Patterson, the county physician, attended Mr. Sloan and endeavored to restore him to health without sending him to the asylum. He performed an operation on Mr. Sloan, removing one of his eyes, the sight of which had been destroyed several years ago. After the operation Mr. Sloan gradually grew weaker until death relieved him of his suffering.

Mr. Sloan lived alone in Warner, where he had accumulated some property, and also had about \$300 in the First National Bank of Lakeview.

The remains were kept till Monday awaiting the arrival of relatives, who were coming from Oklahoma. R. S. Smith arrived here Saturday evening and took charge of the remains which were interred in the I. O. O. F. cemetery, Monday afternoon.

Deceased was aged about 50 years.
