O. Boyer, of Willamette University;  
Hon. A. M. Crawford, Attorney-Gen-  
eral; Prof. W. C. Smith, M. D.;  
Hon. R. E. L. Steiner, M. D.; and  
Henry McConnell, secretary. The  
subjects of the examination will be:  
Writing and spelling; arithmetic;  
algebra; plane geometry; English  
grammar; composition and English  
literature; geography; and American  
history and civil government.
