 - First Race, ¼ mile dash, purse 200
 - Second Race, ½ fur. for 3-year-olds, purse 200
 - SECOND DAY--JULY 3rd
 - Third Race, ½ mile dash, purse \$150
 - Fourth Race, ¾ mile heat, purse 200
 - THIRD DAY--JULY 4th
 - Fifth Race, ¾ mile dash, purse \$150
 - Sixth Race, ¾ mile heats, purse 175
 - FOURTH DAY--JULY 6th
 - Seventh Race, ¾ mile dash, purse \$150
 - Eighth Race, 1 mile dash, purse 200
 - FIFTH DAY--JULY 7th
 - Ninth Race, 1½ mile dash, for trotters and pacers, purse \$100
- There will probably be other races on the last day.

All races are free for all. CONDITIONS.
