The above editorial appeared in the central Oregonian last week. We do not see the motive for the article. In the first place Mr. west cannot play greenhorn; he is too well known here by old residents. In regard to Mr. currier's place of residence in the county, the Examiner believes that so long as the Silver Lake people holds no claim to the beautiful and valuable Summer Lake valley, the South end will gladly accept that locality as a part of the south end and most certainly Mr. currier and all the rest of the people of Summer Lake are acceptable to us. We'll take 'em.

Now we will take the precincts in the county disowned by the Oregonian as Northern Lake county precincts and show the people who elected the assessor two years ago, and let them see whether or not the south end of the county tried to "vote Silver Lake down."

Summer Lake gave West 20, Umbach 1, Paisley gave west 73, Umbach 21, crooked creek gave west 23, Umbach 15, Thomas creek gave west 13, Umbach 22, South Warner gave west 36, Umbach 14, North Warner gave west 12, Umbach 17, Goose Lake gave west 26, Umbach 22, Drews Valley gave west 4, Umbach 19, Pine creek gave west 55, Umbach 23, South Lakeview gave west 46, Umbach 73, North Lakeview gave west 39, Umbach 77.

These figures show that Northern Lake county's candidate for assessor received 347 votes in the so-called southern precincts, while the candidate from the south end received only 310, thus we helped Northern Lake county to elect its candidate, a democrat, while the county was strongly republican. Can there be any complaint made at such liberality? We do, and always have taken off our hats when Northern Lake county wanted an office.

This year it was a free pitch-in, and each precinct in the county had the same opportunity as each other precinct. Now, Bro., if the Examiner's figures two weeks ago made you feel like a 4-year-old child, these figures ought to further rejuvenate you to an unborn babe.

**Hitchcock The Boss.**

Although there are about \$10,000,000 in the reclamation fund, and the annual increase is large, all efforts so far for further government work on new irrigation projects is without avail. Secretary of the Interior, Hitchcock, in this as in a multitude of other things Western, absolutely declines to make any concession to the urgent appeals of a multitude of districts. He expresses his purpose of awaiting developments from some of the work undertaken, says the fund has been sufficiently reduced for the present, and will not consider new projects.

This and many other things in the record of the secretary has given rise to the western spirit of opposition, and the hope that some time early this administration there will be a change. Western men ridicule the assumption of paragon virtues and watch-dog duty over Western lawlessness each time the secretary of the Interior is criticised. They think that this capital stock has been well exhausted, and the nation should see that the West is not more lawless than any other section, if judged by the same standards. Some of the very things which have been seized upon for the proud vindication of the secretary's imperious rule, grew and developed under his regime, and any credit due for prosecution could be no more than attaches to reforming one's own administration and correcting things apparently done with the connivance of parts of the pleas avenger.

The Lake County Agricultural Association will give five days' racing on their track in Lakeview, commencing July 2nd, and ending July 7th, 1906. The sum of \$1450. will be distributed in purses as follows:

- Second Race, 5/8 tur. for 3-year-olds, purse 200

- Fourth Race, 3/4 mile heat, purse 200
- THIRD DAY—JULY 5th
- Fifth Race, 3/4 mile dash, purse \$150
- Sixth Race, 3/4 mile heats, purse 175
- FOURTH DAY—JULY 6th
- Seventh Race, 3/8 mile dash, purse \$150
- Eighth Race, 1 mile dash, purse 200
- FIFTH DAY—JULY 7th
