\$1450 IN PURSES.

Races Commence on Monday, July 2nd.

The Lake County Agricultural Association will give five days' racing on their track in Lakeview, commencing July 2nd, and ending July 7th, 1906. The sum of \$1450. will be distributed in purses as follows:

- FIRST DAY--JULY 2nd
- First Race, 1/2 mile dash, purse \$125
- Second Race, 5/8 fur. for 3-year-olds, purse 200
- SECOND DAY--JULY 3rd
- Third Race, 3/4 mile dash, purse \$150
- Fourth Race, 1/2 mile heat, purse 200
- THIRD DAY--JULY 5th
- Fifth Race, 3/4 mile dash, purse 150
- Sixth Race, 3/4 mile heats, purse 175
- FOURTH DAY--JULY 6th
- Seventh Race, 3/4 mile dash, purse \$150
- Eighth Race, 1 mile dash, purse 200
- FIFTH DAY--JULY 7th
- Ninth Race, 1 1/2 mile dash, for trotters and pacers, purse \$100

There will probably be other races on the last day.

All races are free for all.

CONDITIONS.
All of the above races are free for all, four to enter and three to start but the Association reserves the right to hold a less number than four by reducing the purse in proportion to the number of horses entered.
