Shearing Sheep By Machine

There is unfortunately a scarcity of good sheep shearers in all our eastern states. It is a trade that any vigorous young man may learn, with sure expectation of making good wages for some weeks each season, says Joseph E. Wing in his new work on sheep farming in America, from which the cut is reproduced. The use of machinery, according to Mr. Wing, has now become common in shearing sheep, and machines are sufficiently well perfected so that they do their work with little trouble from breakage. It is far easier to



learn to shear sheep with the machine than by hand, though old shearers prefer the hand shears and can shear as many sheep in the old fashioned way as with the machine. Not so, however, with the novice. He will shear twice as many with the machine as he will with hand shears.
 The work is far better done with the machine. There are no cuts from shears, and the fleeces are taken off closely and evenly. There need be made no second cuts, which cause short fibers no better than shoddy. The machine in careful hands will cut in two every tick and leave the sheep clear of that vermin.
 Against its use is the cost of the machine, about \$15 for a hand machine and the cost of repairs. If well oiled and cared for, however, it will last many seasons, with occasional renewal of cutting parts. The unskilled labor of a boy to turn the crank may usually be had for a small sum.
When to Shear.
 Mr. Wing, living on the fortieth parallel, usually shears his ewe flock the first week in April and sometimes the last week in March. One advantage of this early shearing is that about this time ewes that have been well fed often experience a little loosening of the wool, as though it were time to shed it off, and locks will be lost, particularly about the neck.

FORAGE CROPS.
The Canada Pea and the Cowpea.
 Where They Grow Best.
 The Canada field pea, which is a true pea, must be sowed early to get best results, but in middle and southern Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and farther south the hot, damp days of June and July blight and mildew the Canada pea. We have tried them several times in Illinois and three out of four years with that result, says a correspondent in Orange Judd Farmer. Farmers in this territory when they see the word pea in connection with stock feed think of the cowpea, a tropical plant that would rot in the ground if planted as early as the Canada pea. The cowpea must not be put in the ground until weather and soil are both warm, too late for oat sowing, and must be covered shallow in fine mellow soil. The Canada pea makes early pasture for May, June and July north of the line indicated. The cowpea comes in about the middle of July and grows its best ticks in August, September and October or until frost.

The Farm Horse in Summer.
 A grass diet is not conducive to hard work, as it causes too much sweating and that has an inclination to weaken the system, but grass in limited quantities is beneficial to a horse as an appetizer, says Cyrus Greene in American Cultivator.
 I do not like the practice of turning the horses out at night while hard work is on hand, for a horse with a stomach full of wet grass is in no condition for a forenoon's work. Also, the horse that has been on his feet most of the night gathering provender is not in condition for work the next day. With all other suitable environments a horse must lie down and rest and sleep to put him in the best condition for a day's work, and there is nothing like a well bedded stall to favor this.

A Feeling For Smaller Barns.
 The later tendency seems to be in favor of smaller barns and more of them, according to Farmers Advocate, the object being to avoid congestion and to minimize the danger from fire. The barns should be far enough apart to make each building its own hazard only.

Prizes For Young Things Only.
 An exchange suggests that fairs presenting exhibits of fat stock this season should give prizes "for young things only. This is the day of early maturity, and the fairs should encourage it."
