The price of beef has been the source of considerable inquiry from cattle raisers throughout this country. A telegram was received in Lakeview a few days ago by a gentleman who is here for the purpose of buying beef and mutton, stating that beef can be bought in the Sacramento valley for 5 cents per pound. To the many inquiries as to the price of fall beef there can be no satisfactory reply as yet. Sellers, we understand are intending to hold out for the same price they received last fall.

Tuesday mornings there is no mail from the West, on account of the discontinuance of the Sunday service over the Klamath Lake railroad. We understand that Klamath Falls is moving vigorously in the direction of re-establishing the daily mail service by means of a new route, which we hope they will succeed in. It is feared, however, that the new route, striking the Southern Pacific where it does, at Weed, that Oregon mails will be one day later in its arrival than heretofore.

Monday the Lakeview Water Co. returned to the system that has been in vogue in former years for supplying water for irrigation purposes. There has been plenty of water for all purposes this summer and patrons were allowed to use the water when ever they wished. Most of them let the water run all the time, thereby reducing the pressure in the mains till the tank on the hill could not be filled for reserve and it was necessary to shut off the whole town during the time it took to fill the tank, and water could not be had for even house use. This was not satisfactory altogether, so the Co. resorted to the old system of letting patrons irrigate certain hours, so that the tank can be filled at off hours with out affecting the supply for house use. The company has also arranged to use the fire bell to call time with. When the bell is given three taps it is a signal to shut off all irrigating hydrants.

While other towns in Lakeview's class are going in debt headover heels and bonding for all they are worth for the sake of putting on a pleasant front, Lakeview is going out of debt faster than anybody thinks for, and at the same time makes good an appearance as any town in this or any other Western state. Our town is in perfect sanitary condition, we have good schools, as good as there are in the state, good, neat city buildings, maintain the best of water and electric systems, keep up our streets and sidewalks as well as any town and better than lots of them; only occasionally a bad place in the streets is called to the attention of the council, which is most always attended to at once, and without any flattery, we can say from the expressions of visitors Lakeview presents as neat and prosperous appearance as any town or city anywhere near its size in the West. A little over a year ago the town was in debt over \$13,000, after another meeting of the council, which will be next Tuesday, the indebtedness will be cut down to about \$6000 more.
