This concrete block can be seen at the First National Bank. A great many fine buildings in cities are being built of this composition, which is desirable both for its durability and lightness for tall buildings, and for the ventilation it affords. The blocks are about 19x12x20 inches, oblong in shape and are hollow, having a partition in the center. When laid, jointed as bricks are laid, a flue extends from the ground to the top of the wall, which may be tapped at any place for the insertion of a stove pipe, or be used for ventilation. The blocks are made of gravel and cement, and are cemented together when placed in the wall.
