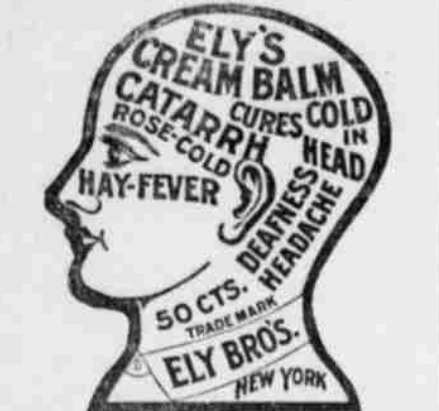

PRIZES FOR FINE LAWNS.

Improvement Society's Plan to Encourage Cleanliness and Beauty. The Douglas Improvement Association of Chicago has hit on a scheme for the encouragement of cleanliness and beauty in its district which promises excellent results.

In addition, those who secure honorable mention will be awarded bronze medals to the number of twenty-five. The Judges will come from without the district, and none of the officers of the association is eligible for the competition.

The result hoped for by the association is not merely the improvement of lawn space. The rules of the competition are so framed as to compel all who enter to comply with the city clean street ordinances. No one contributing to the smoke nuisance will be eligible, and no one who has not paid his subscription to the association at the rate of \$1 a month for each twenty-five feet street frontage can win a prize.

The points governing the awards are divided so that the winner is just as likely to be the owner of a sixteen foot lot as the person who has 200 feet frontage at a corner. The idea of the association is to get as many into the competition as possible, and for that reason it offers as much to those who attend to simple cleanliness as to the aesthetes who can afford to devote themselves to fancy flower beds and shrubbery.

Sixty points are to go for the condition of all grass or lawn space, front and back, including the parkway, except on boulevards where the city attends to the lawn. Decorative features, such as flower beds, shrubs and vines, will merit twenty points, and the remaining twenty are apportioned for the condition of garbages cans, no credit at all being allowed if the ordinance is not complied with.

RAILROAD PLANTING.

Hints on Landscape Treatment of Station Grounds and Approaches.

In a lecture delivered last summer at Chautauqua, Lester C. Griffith hinted in a very practical manner the application of landscape gardening principles to railroad property, says the Brooklyn Eagle. He pointed out that the station, including both buildings and grounds, is a focal point through which the traveling public passes. To introduce and direct the passengers to the town is the controlling principle in station grounds design.

The materials applicable to railroad planting need to be hardy on account of the dusty and smoky conditions which they must endure. The short lived flower patch is a poor and expensive apology for the vastly superior and less expensive perennial planting.

The Beauty of a Landscape. "Why should the ornamental tree society confine its labors to the highways only?" asks Henry D. Thoreau. "Does not the landscape deserve attention? What are the natural features which make a township handsome? A river, with its waterfalls and meadows, a lake, a hill, a cliff or individual rocks, a forest and ancient trees standing singly. Such things are beautiful. They have a high use which dollars and cents never represent.
