Cannon for President.

There is more or less talk going the rounds that "Uncle Joe" Cannon will be a candidate for the presidency in 1908. "Uncle Joe" is 70 years old, past. In November, 1906, he will be six months past 72, and at the expiration of the next presidential term, March 4, 1912, which date every body hopes and expects our next president will live to see, and retain his mental faculties which aids him to the position, "Uncle Joe" Cannon, if he lives, will lack but a few days of 77 years of age.

Everybody loves "Uncle Joe," who admires an honest, conservative and intelligent man. He is great, there is no doubt, and were his 70-year-old frame as rigid as a steel, strengthened by age and application as his mental faculties up to date, no better timber for a president could be found. "Uncle Joe" is a spry old man, and no doubt could thrash nine-tenths of the young or men who would tell him he was near the jumping off place; but, nevertheless, age will tell, and the years cannot be stayed, even by the unanimous will of the people. This is not Ostrerism; men have lived to 80 and remained active and intelligent to the last and have been capable of rendering valuable service to government, but the better time for judging a man's usefulness after 75, is after the service has been performed.

Should Mr. Cannon be nominated, the vice-president would suddenly become the most important place on the national ticket a second place has ever assumed in the history of the United States government. The campaign might be upset by such an irregularity, so let us hope that the friends of "Uncle Joe" Cannon will be content with the services he is able to render in less dependent positions, and the consolation that he could have been president of the United States had not Father Time placed the embargo upon his useful career.

Teachers Institute Monday.

Again we call attention to the Teachers Institute which is to be held next week in Lakeview. Beginning Monday evening at the Opera House at 7:30 o'clock where an address will be given by one of the conductors, and continuing the 18th, and 19th, we anticipate the best institute ever held in Lake county.

The speakers for the occasion are State Supt. J. H. Ackerman; Pres. of the State University, P. L. Campbell and President of the State Normal at Monmouth, E. D. Ressler.

Supt. Ackerman and Pres. Campbell need no introduction to the people of Lakeview as they have been with us before and they are sure of good audiences and a glad welcome.

President Ressler is a new speaker to the citizens of our town but his reputation as a leading educator in Oregon is sufficient to warrant the attendance of all lovers of good educational work.

The day sessions will be held at the school house. The evening sessions will be held in the Opera House. The speaking will be interspersed with good music. No admission fee, no collection. A cordial invitation is extended to all to attend both day and evening.
