**School Soon Begins.**

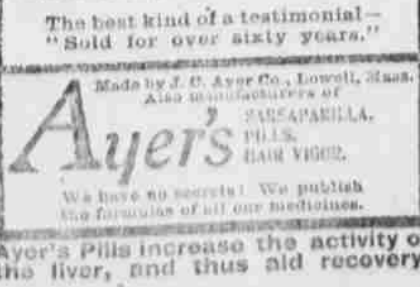
