

The department of Superintendence of the Oregon State Teachers' Association held a special session at the capitol in Salem on Friday and Saturday of last week, for the discussion of needed school legislation. The department is composed of county and city superintendents and all school principals. There was a general discussion of the present status of school laws and a committee was appointed to draft bills for such laws as were agreed upon as needed for the advancement of the cause of the public schools of Oregon. It is unfortunate that circumstances are such that Lake County cannot have a representative in these conferences, as Lake is among the foremost of the state in educational matters. This statement is no unwarranted boast, but is substantiated by statements of prominent educators of the state who chance to pay this county an occasional visit. Our school exhibits at the St. Louis Fair, as has been formerly stated by the Examiner, were among the most noteworthy, according to the statements of Prof. Search, of Massachusetts, who visits all world's fairs and views the school exhibits, and also lectures in every state in the Union on educational matters. Lake county also has the name of paying its teachers the highest price paid by any county in the state, which is another evidence that our schools are among the best, as the highest priced teachers are sure to make the best schools. Therefore, it is most important that we be represented in every conference held within our reach, for the purpose of discussing school matters and devising plans to better the conditions in the state school laws. We heard a very thoughtful man say the other day that the school laws of Oregon were almost ideal; that they were good, and working to the apparent best advantage to the pupils of the state, especially the children of the more sparsely settled districts, where facilities are most difficult to accomplish. Mr. Ackerman stated in the Examiner Office, while he was here a few weeks ago, that it was the out side districts that mostly needed his attention and legislation, as the city schools were able to take care of themselves. Taking this view of the conditions, it is apparent that representatives from these outside districts are necessary in all discussions for the betterment of the schools of the state. Since the distance is so great to reach the places where these conferences are usually held as to make attendance by county superintendents of Eastern Oregon counties prohibitory, it seems that appropriations by county courts for the expenses of the trip would not be ill-spent money.
