A Magazine Without a Name

A nameless weekly has just made its appearance in San Francisco. Instead of a headline it has a question mark.

Earnest Simpson, managing editor of the San Francisco Call, Frederick Moore of the "Examiner," Arthur Dunne, city editor of the San Francisco "Bulletin" and James Tyler of the editorial staff of the San Francisco "Chronicle..."

Though the new magazine is yet nameless its first number is by no means lacking in individuality or strong original features.

The leading article, as might be expected from a San Francisco Magazine, is on the present situation in the stricken city at the Golden Gate.

"Through a White Man's Country in the Philippines," by Hamilton Wright, gives a graphic description of the proposed transcontinental Philippines Railway.

The first installment of a romance, "The Empress of Corevado," by John Fleming Wilson, and "Victoriano Lorenzo," the first of a series of Central American character sketches by Lieut. Arthur Dutton, both have as their locale the only remaining land of romance and adventure left to writers since Rudyard Kipling came out of the East with his wonderfully colored stories of India.

In addition to these and other contributions there is a dramatic department and two solid pages devoted to the material progress and development of the Pacific Coast.

The nameless weekly is a notable addition to western journalism and judging from the contents of its first number may be depended on to make an honorable name for itself.

The better class of citizens of New York would no doubt hail with delight the proposition to seat Theodore Roosevelt as United States Senator from New York, and he would be an adjunct to the good government wing of the U. S. Senate, but the whole United States feel that this man's valuable service could be more equally distributed if Mr. Roosevelt were sent to Panama to finish his job there, which when commenced, was considered the greatest achievement of modern times.

The city of San Francisco is overrun with thugs and thieves to such an extent that business men of the city have organized and armed themselves to protect their money and property.

Such a state of affairs is almost enough to drive the business men of a city to take arbitrary action.

The Klamath county papers announce numerous cases of robbery and stealing. There seems to be a general epidemic of this kind all over the west.

The president will soon issue a proclamation withdrawing from entry all public lands supposed to contain coal. Meantime an investigation is under way by the geological survey to determine the real character of the lands to be withdrawn, and such as are found not to contain coal deposits will be promptly restored to public entry.

John Barrett of Oregon is in line for promotion. He will be taken from his present position as minister to Columbia, paying \$10,000 a year, and given the ambassadorship to Brazil, with a salary of \$12,000, succeeding Lloyd Griscom, who is to succeed Geo. Von Meyer, who is to enter the president's cabinet in the spring.

The rumor that President Roosevelt aspires to the United States Senate when he retires from the presidency will not do down. It is a safe prediction that Platt of New York will be supplanted, and Platts' chair looks good to Mr. Roosevelt.

The canal commissions' final decision that the only practicable and sane way to dig the Panama canal is by contract, under government ownership, comes to the American people with a sort of "I told you so" satisfaction.

The state Bar Association has begun disbarment proceedings against Albert H. Tanner, former law partner of the late Senator John H. Mitchell. Also a young attorney and justice of the peace of Salem, named H. H. Turner.

Court Proceedings. October 16th, 1906. Court met pursuant to adjournment, all officers present, except C. W. Dent, Commissioner, when the following proceedings were had to wit:

In response to a request, to the newspapers of Lakeview, to file sealed bids for the publishing the delinquent tax list, as is required by law, the Lake County Examiner, submitted the only bid filed, of 25 cents per line, which is the maximum amount, allowed by law to be paid for such work and there being no other bid, the Court awarded said printing to said paper.
