It has been often stated of late that if Hearst is elected to the governorship of New York, he will be the next president. It has gone so far as to be asserted that Mr. Hearst does not care for the governorship only that he considers it a stepping stone to the presidency. The very same men who have made these assertions state facts that do not go with the growing intelligence of the country. When any one asserts or believes that Hearst is strong man for the presidency and gives reasons for his belief such as are accredited to such statements and can be the only foundation for such belief, he must of necessity disclaim the growing intelligence of the American people. If Mr. Hearst must and does, as he is said to be doing by the same prominent politicians who have proclaimed his strength in case he succeeds to the New York governorship, "play up on the ignorance of a certain class of voters; making them believe that their only salvation lies in him, and great throngs of the ignorant and poorly educated classes are beginning to look upon him as the one man who can save the country from certain destruction," then how can these men concede that the world is growing better and wiser. Do the American people want to substantiate these statements by casting their ballots for the man for the highest office in the gift of the people, who must resort and depend upon the ignorant for his main support?

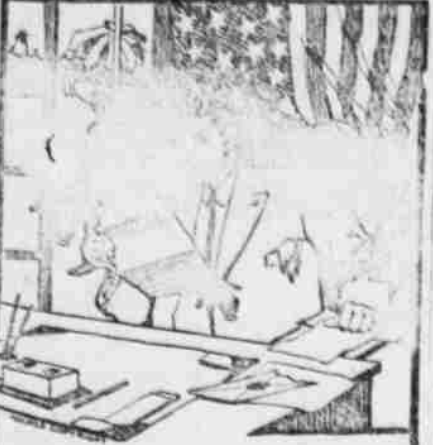
