IMPROVEMENT WORK

OAK PARK'S METHOD OF DOING IT BY SECTIONS.

Big Results Accomplished in the Chicago Suburb by the Town Betterment Association—President Trench Tells of Its Satisfactory Outlook.

By organizing the village of Oak Park, a suburb of Chicago, into divisions, each working for the physical betterment of its own restricted territory, the Oak Park improvement association secures the general welfare of the district, says the Chicago Post. The outlook for this year is satisfactory, according to President Daniel Trench, and the association is now turning its attention to questions which affect the whole community.

"While we have about 100 members in our main organization," explained Mr. Trench a short time ago, "we really transact business at our monthly meetings through the chairman of the sections, who report on general progress and receive and make suggestions."

"The central organization is supported by a nominal subscription of 25 cents from each member. This is spent in securing publicity and distributing circulars. The sections are financed by voluntary subscriptions ranging from \$2 up.

"The village at present is about half organized. Clean streets and alleys are maintained by the subsidiary societies, there being a general committee as well. In the same way we have a committee on vacant lots and parkways. Property owners who neglect their vacant lots are requested to remedy the unsightly conditions, and owners are persuaded to attend to parkways in front of their residences.

"Another committee looks after trees and parks. Oak Park is proud of its trees, and the committee sees that steps are taken to protect them either against the blight—they were threatened with it last year—or against telephone or telegraph companies that would injure them with wires.

"A sentiment in favor of the establishment of small parks is growing in the village. Whether we will obtain these by gift of public spirited men or will organize a park system I do not know. Our committee is helping to define public opinion on this point, and prompt action is likely to result.

"We formed a committee at our last meeting on ordinances and their enforcement." Our committee on smoke complained that it was hard to get action. It reported violations of the ordinance, but steps were not taken to remedy the matter. This new committee is composed of lawyers.

"Oak Park is exceptionally well paved as the result of the last few years' improvements, many of them carried out at the behest of the association. The property owners have been heavily taxed to achieve this. The streets are asphalted in some instances and macadamized in others. Many miles of cement sidewalks have been laid. The alleys are the only thoroughfares that need particular attention. We cannot reasonably agitate having them paved at present, but we hope eventually to see that done.

"We are at present working on the improvement of our garbage and ashes removal. We also are looking into the matter of clearing many of our vacant lots which grow thistles and weeds. We really need a thistle commissioner in Oak Park.

"The improvement association has the support of the entire village. Property owners are well disposed to it, and as our district is mainly occupied by homes every one recognizes the necessity of preventing any section becoming run down or disreputable.

"At our last meeting the question of making Oak Park a prohibition district came up. Our lawyers submitted an opinion, the substance of which was that existing laws virtually constituted our village a prohibition district, and a license cannot be issued without a majority vote on referendum.

"We believe that Oak Park compares favorably with any other suburb of Chicago. The good condition of our streets strikes any visitor, and we have brought our young people into the improvement association so that they do not throw papers about.

"A new association called the Parents' and Teachers' association is forming for the purpose of looking after the schools, a matter of vital interest to our members.

"We have a committee on railroad rights of way which usually occupies itself with the general condition of the rights of way, but now is watching in the interest of the village the projected track elevation.

"Among other things done by the association is the organizing of special sections, the merchants on a particular street, for instance, that are neglecting their locality. For the purpose of encouraging the public generally a synopsis of the principal ordinances will be distributed this season."

The Oak Park Improvement association has been in existence about five years. Its secretary and treasurer is Charles Woodard.

Improving School Grounds.

"Our school grounds and church lots are, as a general thing, bare and unattractive," says Eben E. Rexford in the Outing Magazine. "They ought not to be so. They need not be so after a little effort if the Neighborhood Improvement society takes them in hand. Trees and shrubs properly arranged will make attractive places of them. Flowers will give them a grace and beauty that will appeal to every one interested and arouse in them a desire to do still more in the way of improvement. That is one of the beauties of an organization for neighborhood betterment. It grows by what it does, and the more it does the more it wants to do."
