A Product of the Times. It is Made by the Guests. Among the silly and absurd articles appearing from time to time concerning hotel and tavern keeping, one tells us again and again how the modern hotel is shown to disadvantage when compared with the Inns of colonial days. In these articles the writer dilates and expatiates on the hospitality of the old time tavern, and the cold, indifferent and almost cruel treatment received from the hands of the modern hotel man. Of course every one knows if he will drop sentiment for a moment and give the subject a little sober reflection that the modern traveler, tourist or hotel guest would absolutely refuse the accommodations afforded by the Inn of a hundred years ago. The only advantage of a hotel of those times lay in the fact that the lack of material comforts drew from the traveler a warmer fellow feeling and greater sociability—a condition in which one man was more his brother's keeper than prevails today. Again, the travel by coach and the small number brought together, en route or at the hotel, made closer acquaintance not only possible, but far more desirable than in our day of big hotels and big crowds.

The modern hotel is a product of the times. The wants, desires, whims, fads and, on top of all these, the imperative demands of those who travel have made the hotel of today what it is from the standpoint of food, accommodations, method of service and management and from every point of view. The hotel keeper of today responds to the bidding of the guests. One might almost say of the man and woman who travel: "Here is your hotel. You have planned it, furnished it. You have outlined its methods of management, and it is what you believe should be comprehended in the modern hotel."

The colonial tavern, which would not be tolerated for a moment in our days, was adapted to its times. To speak of it as being superior to the modern hostelry is to claim that the old stage-coach, which left you more weary and worn at the end of a hundred miles than the palace coach does today at the end of a thousand miles, was a superior vehicle of travel to those used on the modern railroad.—Hotel World.
