An Hundred Years Hence.

The prophecy of Thomas A. Edison, detailing what our large cities will be like 100 years hence. He says they will be free from smoke and steam, and that the chimney will be a thing of the past, while the waste of coal and other fuel will be stopped through the use of electricity, generated direct from the fuel without the aid of engine, boiler or dynamo. In factories each machine will have its individual motor. Houses will be heated electrically, and most of the cities' noises will cease. Skyscrapers will be universal in the business section, and the streets will be bridged over at different heights facilitating transit from one side to the other. He estimates that buildings will then average thirty stories in height, and the greater number will be constructed of concrete and steel. Such buildings, he says, will stand a thousand years or longer. His new battery will make electricity portable for street vehicles or airships. This prophecy will have a tendency to cause some people to regret their hastiness in selecting their date of birth.

It is the prophecy of politicians that there will be no tariff legislation in congress this term, and as the next term is the end of a presidential term, it is believed that tariff will be allowed to rest over until after the next presidential election in 1908, and as the new congress will have its hands full, and a short session the earliest possible date for tariff legislation will be 1909. The tariff question is one that will not down, and every year finds more adherents to the policy. President Roosevelt has consented to let the matter rest on account of the dangers to the Republican party so near a presidential election. It will be the main issue in the next campaign, and the candidate who refuses to recognize it as a paramount issue will likely find himself greatly in the minority when the votes are counted.

The demand for a change in the constitution of the United States providing for the election of United States Senators by direct vote of the people is growing every year. The matter will be brought to the attention of congress this session, but how long it will take to pass such a measure no one can tell. It can be readily put through the House, but when it reaches the Senate, there it stops short. But such cannot last much longer, as those senators who oppose it most bitterly will be left at home unless they give in. State legislatures will be pledged with this end in view.

While E. H. Harriman, of greatest railroad fame, has been busy gathering under his fold the control of over 23,000 miles of railroads, representing an aggregate wealth of over \$2,000,000,000, he has so neglected the public service which the law compels common carriers to furnish that the complaint after complaint has met deaf ears at Mr. Harriman's door, has taken the shape of compulsory measures justified by law, to seek relief.
