LAKE COUNT MINES RICH.

mining the country near the Jumbo. Mr. Rogers, who is a prospector of considerable experience, says the Jumbo mine is easily worth \$1,000,000.

Mr. Marks paid \$35,000 for the Sueling claim, adjoining the Jumbo on the east, before any development work was done. Since opening up the property it has proved to be fully as good as the Jumbo. The dyke of ore, precisely the same kind as that of the Jumbo, is over 200 feet in width. Numerous samples have been taken across the 200 feet of the dyke at different places on the claim and none of the samples gave returns less than \$20 to the ton.

The first house in the district was erected by Mr. Marks. He now has a crew of men a work opening up the dyke to the depth of 300 feet by tunnel and will install a 50-ton gold-quartz mill at the mine in the early spring.

Nevada and Colorado mining men are beginning to arrive at Lakeview to look over the district, and from all indications Southern Oregon will have this coming year a genuine stampede based on gold foundations. William H. Hosler, of Ashland, a mining man of wide experience, says the Warner district is as good as the Tonopah and Goldfield districts, and better.

Gib Gaylord Dead.

The death last Thursday, of Gib Gaylord a pioneer of Lake county, who had resided at Paisley for many years, came as a surprise to those who knew him. He had not been feeling very well for a day or two, being troubled with a rupture. Dr. Witham had prepared a liniment for him to be applied externally, only, as it contained poison, and so marked the bottle. Gib went into the club room of the Cooley saloon and lay down to rest, and when next seen, was dead. The bottle of liniment and a bottle of whiskey were near him and examination disclosed the fact that he had drunk from the liniment. It is not known whether intentional or accidental.

Gib Gaylord was aged about 60 years, had never been married. He had two brothers, Stephen, of Paisley, and Norton, who lives in Dakota. He was engaged in the saloon business at Paisley for many years, but of late has devoted his time to prospecting. The funeral services were held on Friday by Rev. A. J. Armstrong, of Lakeview, and the remains were laid to rest in the Paisley cemetery.

M. Swartout, whom The Examiner mentioned last week as being on his way to Lake county to investigate irrigation projects, came as far as Bonanza, where he took sick and remained a few days, intending to return to Seattle, but will be here later on. Men are on the ground, however, who will keep the ball rolling.

Ralph Toler, of Davis Creek, who a few months ago bought the dynamo and electrical apparatus from the Lakeview light plant, now has the plant in operation at Davis Creek, and is furnishing that section with electric lights.
