"China Sam" Dies.

"Sam," a familiar character in Lakeview, of the Oriental type, died last Sunday between the hours of 12, M., and 3, P. M. No one was with him when he died. Sam cut his hand last Friday, a week prior to his death, on the ragged edge of a cuspidore, while washing it, and blood poison set in, causing his death. He came to America about 45 years ago, locating at Cedarville, where he conducted a wash house, removing to Lakeview several years ago.

It is the Chinese custom to have roast pig and chicken and burn paper money at the funeral of one of their people, but Sam died poor, and as some of the other Chinamen of this place say, "went to the beyond hungry." The funeral was conducted Monday by Eli, and attended by all the deceased's countrymen here. The ceremony was very simple and the remains were buried in the cemetery north of town.

Shooting at Reno.

The Sacramento Bee of the 10th contained an article stating that H. H. Thompson had entered the saloon of Al Enright, in Reno, and a difficulty arose between the two men, resulting in the shooting three times of Enright by Thompson. Al Enright is a brother of F. M. and Jim Green, of this place. Later the news reached here that Enright was the man who did the shooting, and that Thompson was lying at the hospital in a critical condition. The first story went that Thompson had entered Enright's saloon and threatened the latter with violence on account of slanderous remarks which Thompson alleged Enright had made about him. Enright undertook to eject the intruder when the shooting commenced.
