was ove to Lakeview. While there the Goose Lake scheme was heard of, investigated and practically decided on. But Carroll was a hard nut to crack. He had the situation well in hand and in a fair position to dictate terms. So a campaign of waiting was decided on, so far as the railr ad was concerned. But the Goose Lake irrigation enterprise was to go ahead. C. H. McKendree, of Bonanza, who was really the man who brought the proposition to the attention of the capitalists, was authorzed to go ahead and get options on as much land as he could secure. In this work he has been engaged for the past two months or more, and has been quite successful in his efforts, tying up a big body of land at from \$2 to \$5 an acre.

In the meantime, negotiations were carried on with Carroll, and The Republican is in receipt of reliable information that the Hewitt Land company has consented to finance the electrical road, and that it will be built on to Lakeview. Carroll is now in Seattle making final arrangements to complete the deal.
