Perhaps none will suffer more than newspaper men from the effect of the Hepburn anti-pass law, which went into effect Tuesday, January 1 1907. The newspapers have received notice of cancellation of all existing contracts for advertising for which the publishers received transportation as pay. The law provides that nothing but cash shall be received by the railroads for tickets, thus depriving the press from paying for rides in its own wares. The result will be that most newspaper men will get to stay at home.

A reform crusade is on in Portland. A man who owned and conducted a notorious den in what is known as the "north end," was compelled to close his joint some weeks ago, and not allowed to re-open, and he is seeking revenge on all inmates of immoral houses by inaugurating a crusade in the city's tenderloin district.

eration of being permitted to select 87,000 acres in a compact body the company surrendered 111,000 acres in lieu thereof.

After this settlement was reached Senator Fulton was asked to present the bill, as prepared by the Secretary of the Interior and the land attorneys to congress, which he did, after, however, consulting the Secretary of the Interior as to his approval of the measure. The act was passed, and placed it entirely at the option of the Secretary of the Interior permitting exchange, (the final deal was made a short time ago, so we understand). Thus Senator Fulton was relieved of any responsibility.

Third Term League.

Regardless of the repeated refusals of Mr. Roosevelt to consider a third term as president, what is termed the "Third Term National League," has been organized in Chicago by Edward A. Horner, formerly of Leadville, Colorado, who says he is a "red hot Democrat driven to the verge of bankruptcy by the machinations of the 'system'." In his organizing address Mr. Horner said:

President Roosevelt is the people's choice, irrespective of party, and demanding his nomination in 1908.

"We intend to have a member in every county of every state in the Union." The state chairman will be sounded on the matter and their cooperation will be sought, but this is a people's movement, not a politicians' movement. It is true the President has said he would not run again, but we take the position that if the people need him and insist that he serve another term he cannot refuse."

The head of the fire department of Lakeview, Monday got out all the hose carts in the department and carefully inspected them and made a test of all fire plugs of the two main streets of the town. Two circumstances played co-incidentally about this action. One was the near approach of New Years, when resolutions are in order, and many flock to the water wagon, and the other, is that the members of the department had read the story told in "light vein" of the over precautions fire chief who directed that the departmental officials inspect the hose and apparatus two days before every fire.

With over a million immigrants coming annually to the United States the President has decided that the time for drastic immigration legislation has arrived and it is announced that soon after the holiday recess of Congress an executive message will be sent in outlining the legislation which it is advisable to enact.

A sweeping order has been made by the Secretary of the Interior suspending the issuance of patent under any form of entry until such entry shall be investigated and examined by a special agent of the general land office.

Senator Fulton has the promise of recommendation of an amendment to the bill repealing the timber and stone act, providing that 20 percent. of all sales of timber lands go to the county in which the timber is located.

Raffles Unlawful.

The grand jury of Modoc county reported last week on the various matters under investigation by that body. Among the other things the grand jury reported that three cases of conducting lotteries, more commonly known as raffles, has been brought to the notice of the jury, and in two of them the offenders had come before the body and plead ignorant of the law in the premises. The cases referred to were the disposal of team of horses by C. W. Walton by raffle, a gold watch by H. H. Putnam and a pistol by E. J. Blake. The report says:

"Particular attention is called to these as they seem to have been conducted with the sole idea of profit on the part of those conducting them.

The plea of ignorance of the law will certainly have greater weight if backed up by an offer to return the money taken; promising reform and pocketing the receipts go not do well together."
