Judge Long Dead.

Judge A. K. Long, for many years a well known and prominent citizen of Cedarville, passed away, at his home last Friday, Dec. 28, 1906. The Cedarville Record says:

"Judge' Long, as he was familiarly called, was born in Dayton Ohio, 77 years ago last June. He came to Sacramento county in 1852 and served as sheriff of Sacramento county for several years. Thirty-five years ago he came to Surprise Valley for the benefit of his wife's health, and engaged in various enterprises, among others, was hotel keeper, cattle raiser and sheep raiser, and served Cedarville Township as Justice of the Peace for 35 years almost continuously, and during service as such Justice of the Peace, was considered a 'terror' to evil doers."


