SUMMONS

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for the County of Lake.
Ruby Harvey and Dick J. Wilcox, as Executors of the Estate of William Harvey Deceased, Plaintiffs,
-vs-
J. S. Field, Julia Field, Otis Chandler, George E. Chandler and Andrew McCallen, Defendants.
Suit to foreclose a mortgage.
To J. S. Field, Julia Field and Andrew McCallen, the above named defendants IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You and each of you are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above-entitled court and cause on or before the 31st day of January, 1907, said date being the last day of the time prescribed in the order for publication of summons made herein, and if you fail so to appear or answer, for want thereof, the plaintiffs will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for in said complaint, which is: That the plaintiffs take a decree against you, the defendants, J. S. Field and Julia Field, foreclosing a mortgage on real property, executed by you on December 3d, 1900, in favor of plaintiff's testator, William Harvey; to recover the money due and owing on said mortgage, to-wit: The sum of Nine Hundred and Thirty-four dollars and seventeen cents, together with interest thereon at the rate of ten per cent. per annum from June 25th, 1902, and \$200 attorney's fees and costs of suit; for an order of sale of the lands and premises retained and existing as security in said mortgage, and described as follows, to-wit: Commencing at the South-east corner of Block "O", in the West Addition to the Town of Lakeview, in Lake County, State of Oregon, according to the plat thereof, filed in the office of the County Clerk of the County and State aforesaid, on the 20th day of July, 1878; Thence running North along the Eastern Boundary line of said Block "O," One Hundred and Seventy-three feet; thence at right angles running West One Hundred and Forty feet; thence at right angles running North One Hundred and two feet; thence at right angles running West One Hundred and Forty feet, to the West boundary line of Block "N", in said West Addition; thence South along the West boundary lines of said Blocks "N" and "O", Two Hundred and Seventy-five feet to the South-west corner of said Block "O"; thence East along the South boundary line of said Block "O" Two Hundred and Eighty feet, to the place of beginning.

Also that a certain deed executed by you, the said J. S.
