**SUMMONS**  
In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for the County of Lake.  
Ruby Harvey and Dick J. Wilcox, as Executors of the Estate of William Harvey Deceased, Plaintiffs,  
vs.  
J. S. Field, Julia Field, Otis Chandler, George E. Chandler and Andrew McCallen, Defendants.  
Suit to foreclose a mortgage.

To J. S. Field, Julia Field and Andrew McCallen, the above named defendants IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You and each of you are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled court and cause on or before the 31st day of January, 1907, said date being the last day of the time prescribed in the order for publication of summons made herein, and if you fail so to appear or answer, for want thereof, the plaintiffs will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for in said complaint, which is: That the plaintiffs take a decree against you, the defendants, J. S.
